____ Review final graduation requirements and confirm the student will graduate on time

- ____ For the Final College:
 - ____ Accept college offer. Inform other schools of non-attendance.
 - ____ Pay Enrollment Deposit Fee
 - ____ Set up college email accounts
 - ____ Review daily "To Do List" from your college personal profile webpage or email
 - ____ Ask counselor to send final official high school transcripts
 - _____ Review and sign Residence Hall Contract. Send in Resident Hall Deposit
 - _____ Schedule and take College Placement Tests. Prepare in advance.
 - _____ Attend orientation. Find out who your Academic Advisor is. Register for classes.

____ Watch your college and personal email daily. Use personal email for all correspondence, your Flambeau School email is shut off after graduation.

Additional TIPS:

- Work hard all the way to graduation—second-semester grades can affect scholarship eligibility.
- Appy for Dual Enrollment Courses via Early College Credit Program and/or Start College Now Courses by October 1, February 1. Click here: <u>https://dpi.wi.gov/dual-enrollment</u>
- Stay involved in after-school activities, and seek leadership roles if possible, which is even more important now because many schools have ACT be optional.
- Compare colleges: <u>https://collegescorecard.ed.gov/</u>
- Well before your college application deadlines, ask your counselor and teachers to submit the required documents (e.g., transcript, letters of recommendation) to the colleges to which you're applying. You can take virtual tours here: www.campustours.com.
- Complete any last scholarship applications, including the TIP Grant <u>https://dpi.wi.gov/weop/tip-grant</u> and GEAR
 UP Scholarship <u>https://dpi.wi.gov/weop/gearup/scholarship</u> for WEOP students such as you.
- Visit colleges that have invited you to enroll.

- Contact a school's financial aid office if you have questions about the aid that school has offered you. In fact, getting to know your financial aid staff early is a good idea no matter what—they can tell you about deadlines, paperwork you might need to submit, and other aid for which you might wish to apply. Set up your new college student portal and check your "To Do List".
- When you decide which school to attend, notify that school of your commitment and submit any required financial deposit. Many schools require this notification and deposit by May 1.
